

# Tying Instructions



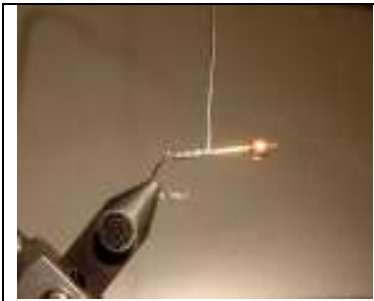
**Bead Head Woolly  
(Black)**

**#FTK007**



**Step 1.**

**Place bead over hook toward eye and clamp into your vice.**



**Step 2.**

**Start just after bend of hook and wrap lead wire on close turns to form the weighted under body.**



**Step 3.**

**Apply a coat of strong glue to keep the lead wire from spinning. Allow glue to dry before proceeding to the next step. ( I glue up a half dozen ahead of time)**



**Step 4.**

**Tie on a bit of marabou (Hook shank length) (Save your trim off piece for next bug) and add a couple of strands of flash just at end of lead wire wrap.**

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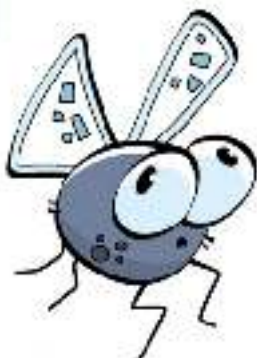
## Step 5.

**Tie on your grizzly microbarb saddle then attach the chenille at the end just before the lead wire. Bring your thread to the bead head.**



## Step 6.

**Wrap the chenille to the bead head and tie it off and trim. Wrap the grizzly microbarb saddle in the opposite direction, you turned the chenille, toward the bead head and tie off and trim. Whip finish and apply a little of head cement.**



## Step 7.

**HINT #1: I use one drop of Zap-a-gap glue to hold lead wire to the hook and let set an at least one hour.**

**HINT #2: You can get two tails out of one pinch marabou. First one will be the pointy ends and the next one will be the fluffy trim you made off the first trim.**



## Step 8.

**HINT #3: When winding grizzly microbarb, I secure the trailing tip then use hackle pliers.**

**HINT #4: If necessary I may trim hackle to make it more even from bead head to tail. (Never seen a fish closely examine hackle tips to see if was pointy or cut prior to hitting this bug.**
